A Xhosa word that encapsulates all our aspirations about how to live life well, together, ubuntu is the belief that “I am only because you are.” By embracing the philosophy of ubuntu and living it out in daily life, it’s possible to overcome division and be stronger together in a world where the wise build bridges, not walls. On a spring afternoon in 1985 in Gary, Indiana, a 15-year-old Black girl, Paula Cooper, kills an elderly White woman and beloved Bible teacher in a violent home invasion. Paula is sentenced to death. Then the victim’s grandson Bill forgives the girl and campaigns to spare her life, beginning a friendship with Paula in the process. As Paula waits on death row, her fate sparks a debate that not only animates legal circles but raises vital questions about the value of human life: What are we demanding when we call for justice? Is forgiveness an act of desperation or profound bravery? (V)

Chin's killers pled guilty to manslaughter and received only a \$3,000 fine and three years' probation. The lenient sentence sparked outrage. The protests that followed led to a federal civil rights trial—the first involving a crime against an Asian American person—and galvanized what came to be known as the Asian American movement. Some were shop owners and some were factory workers, but all had similar hopes and dreams.

For humans, light-induced sleep disturbances impact hormones and weight and can contribute to mental health problems. He cannot foresee the perilous boat trips, relentless desert treks, pointed guns, and arrests that await him; nor can he know those two weeks will expand into two life-altering months alongside fellow migrants who will come to encircle him like family. In 1985, Hinton was arrested and charged with two counts of capital murder in Alabama. Stunned, he knew it was a case of mistaken identity. But with no money and a different system of justice for a poor Black man in the South, Hinton was sentenced to death by electrocution. He spent his first three years on Death Row in agonizing despair and anger. But as Hinton realized and accepted his fate, he resolved not only to survive but find a way to live, becoming a beacon to his fellow inmates, 54 of whom were executed mere feet from his cell. Hinton won his release in 2015.
