

Pastor's Ponderings: Listen to Jesus

About eight days after Jesus said these things, he took Peter, John, and James, and went up on a mountain to pray. As he was praying, the appearance of his face changed and his clothes flashed white like lightning. Two men, Moses and Elijah, were talking with him. They were clothed with heavenly splendor and spoke about Jesus' departure, which he would achieve in Jerusalem. Peter and those with him were almost overcome by sleep, but they managed to stay awake and saw his glory as well as the two men with him.



As the two men were about to leave Jesus, Peter said to him, "Master, it's good that we're here. We should construct three shrines: one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah"—but he didn't know what he was saying. Peter was still speaking when a cloud overshadowed them. As they entered the cloud, they were overcome with awe.

Then a voice from the cloud said, "This is my Son, my chosen one. Listen to him!" Even as the voice spoke, Jesus was found alone. They were speechless and at the time told no one what they had seen. (Luke 9:28-36, Common English Bible)

While up on the Mountain of Transfiguration, three of Jesus' closest disciples heard a voice from heaven declare, "Listen to him!" (v. 35). It's one thing to hear someone speak words and phrases, but it's so easy for us to allow those words to go in one ear and out the other.

It's an entirely different thing for us to truly listen to what someone is saying to us and to absorb the deeper meaning of what is being said. Our invitation this Lent is to truly listen to Jesus.

The forty days of the Lenten season leading up to Easter invite us to make the journey to the Cross with Jesus. As we travel there, we're invited to lean in and listen deeply to him. It's only by truly listening to him that our lives are radically transformed.

This year, the season of Lent begins on Valentine's Day. Perhaps that will inspire us to meditate on the overwhelming love God has for each of us. Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of Lent, a season that's meant to prepare us for the events of Holy Week and, ultimately, the great Easter celebration where we stand in awe of God's power in the Resurrection of Jesus. I'm excited that several young people from our Confirmation Class will be leading various parts of the Ash Wednesday Service, which will begin at 7:00 p.m. in our Sanctuary.

Please look around this newsletter for details about Lenten activities, including Sunday Evening Community Lenten Services at various UM churches in the Wooster area, Experiential Prayer in the Chapel, and more. Let's make space to Listen to Jesus this Lent.

A special-called session of the North Central Jurisdiction (NCJ) Jurisdictional Conference of The United Methodist Church was held on Tuesday, January 23 "for the sole purpose of approving new episcopal areas for episcopal assignments to be effective September 1, 2024."

Delegates to this special-called NCJ Jurisdictional Conference voted to form two new episcopal areas, one to include the East Ohio Conference and the West Ohio Conference, and one to include the Northern Illinois Conference and the Wisconsin Conference. The two conferences in each new episcopal area will share one bishop.

By the action of the special session, the North Central Jurisdiction will transition from nine to seven episcopal areas. The North Central Jurisdiction Committee on the Episcopacy assigns the bishops to the episcopal areas and all assignments will be announced at the NCJ Jurisdictional Conference July 10-13 in Sioux Falls, South Dakota. The new episcopal areas and the bishop assignments to each of the seven episcopal areas will be effective September 1.

Executive staff leaders and members of the Committee on the Episcopacy in both the East Ohio Conference and the West Ohio Conference have been engaged in strategic conversations to explore the sharing of an episcopal leader since the NCJ Committee on the Episcopacy proposed the possibility during the 2022 Jurisdictional Conference.
